ICOMOS Appoints Philippe Allard to the Post of Director-General L'ICOMOS



UVA Studio for Interventions in the Historic Core of Cape Coast, Ghana

A group of 4th-year undergraduate students from the University of Virginia recently presented the results of a studio for various interventions in the historic core of Cape Coast, Ghana. The studio built upon a relationship with Cape Coast begun by US/ICOMOS in 1995 when the first US/ICOMOS internship was held there. Three years later, US/ICOMOS managed a portion of a two-year project funded by USAID focusing on the conservation and development of tourism within Cape Coast and around established World Heritage sites. In 2006, the Samuel H. Kress Foundation sponsored a follow-up assessment of that work conducted by Gina Haney (former US/ICOMOS Intern and former US/ICOMOS Board member) and Theresa Coolahan (US/ICOMOS International Intern), with a follow-up internship by Kaci Keperle working on Gothic House in Cape Coast.

The proposed architectural, landscape, and urban planning interventions were presented by the students at the National Building Museum April 17, 2012. Several past program directors of US/ICOMOS, along with representatives from the US Department of State and other agencies were in attendance. A small group of UVA students will travel to Cape Coast this summer for fieldwork.

Celebrating the 40th anniversary of the World Heritage Convention and the 20th anniversary of the Declaration on Cultural Landscapes, this conference will bring together scholars and professionals from around the world to address the debates over the interrelationship between culture and nature, the challenges of preservation within historic urban landscapes, the development of an integrated approach to identifying and assessing cultural landscapes, and the challenges of developing conservation strategies that reflect the complexities of world cultures and sites and respect their multiple stakeholders.
