US/ICOMOS Celebrates the Conclusion of the 2017 International Exchange Program



US/ICOMOS hosted a symposium and closing reception on August 16th to share and celebrate the achievements of our 2017 IEP class (shown in the masthead above). The symposium, entitled "Sustaining Cultural Heritage in the 21st Century" featured poster and individual presentations by the IEP participants along with three topical panels moderated by heritage experts.



The first panel "Managing Cultural Heritage: Designations and Beyond" featured Joana Arruda, Kathryn Clarke, Maryam Rabi, and Rosaura Ramos who shared their learnings from France, Israel, the United States, and India. US/ICOMOS Fellow and Trustee and U.S. Department of State Program Specialist Ellen Delage moderated this heritage management panel.



William Canup (in absentia), Charmaine Ledesma, Richa Pandey, Natalia Sanchez-Hernandez, and Ashley Wheeler spoke to "Heritage as Pillar of Sustainable Development," which was moderated by Jeff Soule, FAICP, immediate past US/ICOMOS Treasurer and Director of Outreach and International Programs of the American Planning Association. Participant projects in India, Jordan, Lithuania, the United States, and Trinidad and Tobago were highlighted.



A third panel presentation of the symposium was "Rising Tides and Eroding Shores: Approaches to Adapting Heritage Buildings." The discussion included Vilte Janusauskaite, Etsegenet Kebede, Komal Potdar, and Rebecca Ramsay. It was expertly moderated by Lisa Craig, US/ICOMOS trustee and Chief of Historic Preservation, Annapolis, Maryland, and IEP host of Rebecca Ramsay. Rebecca assisted in organizing and preparing for [Keeping History Above Water Annapolis](#), a conference scheduled for October 2017, devoted to documenting and distributing best practices, promoting dialogue, and engaging new audiences as rising sea levels impact historic resources and communities.



Goodbyes were shared and certificates awarded at a closing reception held in the beautiful garden of the Heurich House Museum.

Washington, DC


